Three Matzot

No, I am not writing directly about the Coronavirus, only indirectly. At the time of writing in mid-March, developments were happening quickly around the world and no one could predict how things would look by the time Pesach came around in April. All I can say at this point is that we can better understand the gravity and impact of the 10 plagues God inflicted upon Egypt in the context of our contemporary plague.

The preponderance of numbers in the symbolism of the Pesach seder is so conspicuous as to warrant comment. One reason for these numbers is to keep the children engaged, involved or even simply awake late into the evening as the seder progresses. I would like to focus on the number '3', for example the three matzot on the seder table.

Some see the three matzot as symbolic of the unity of all of Israel - Kohanim, Leviim and Israelites. But a deeper understanding concerns three stages in the development of our Peoplehood. First we had to be freed from slavery, second we needed laws to live by (ie. Torah), and finally a place to live and to fulfill those laws. But for these developments to be possible, there had to be a simultaneous three-part psychological revolution.

First there needed to be a realization that present conditions were unacceptable and change was vital for our survival. Otherwise, our People would not have been receptive to Moses's revolutionary leadership and the news that he was going to free them after hundreds of years of slavery. In fact, at first they were not at all receptive to Moses and did not believe him. Their first cry out to God (Exodus 2:23) is the dawn of the realization that things had to change.

Second, despite hundreds of years of oppression under appalling conditions, the People had to be patient and realize that revolutionary change doesn't happen quickly. This is reminiscent of Sefirat (the counting of) Ha'omer when we count each day connecting Pesach to Shavuot (seven weeks later), and patiently anticipate the receiving of the Torah. God inflicted ten, not one or two plagues upon Egypt, until Pharaoh was finally convinced of the prudence of letting the Jews go. And when Moses and Aaron first approached Pharaoh with their message of freedom, not only did Pharaoh not agree, but as bad as things already were, he made conditions worse for our People (Exodus 5:23). Once they were freed, God did not choose the most direct journey to the 'promised land.' God chose a route that lasted 40 years. He was afraid that if they should come across a battle, having been slaves for so long and being unequipped for battle, they would return to Egypt out of fear (Exodus 13:17). After forty years, most of that generation of former slaves had died out and did not get to enjoy the real fruits of their freedom.

The third and final phase is unity, the ability to put aside individual and sectarian differences for unity of purpose and a higher, common goal. Our People responded with one voice when presented with the Torah: "...we shall do it." (Exodus 19:8).

Now back to the Coronavirus. While I mentioned in the opening paragraph that no-one could predict how things would develop over the next month, I believe the message contained herein concerning the three matzot can well be applied to the current crisis in which the world now finds itself. First, there must be the realization that things must change. Second, we must be patient as a cure and solution won't happen quickly. Third, we must put aside geographical and political differences and act in unison for the common good.

I wish all our congregational family a wonderful, healthy, safe Pesach, even if curtailed. And when you enjoy the tasty seder foods, herein lies food for thought as you consume your three matzot!

Passover and Elijah

April ushers in our Passover holiday. Passover is a joyous and pensive holiday commemorating our freedom from the bondage and persecution by the Egyptians as ordered by Pharaoh. Unlike my childhood, with memories of dry sponge cake with frozen strawberries with terrible artificial whipped topping (which often was used for my birthday cake), Passover has transcended over to a culinary extravaganza that I eagerly look forward to every year. Even though some of the food we eat serves to remind us of the hardships and suffering that our ancestors endured, the food choices and recipes offered are amazing.

Every year, we all welcome Elijah into our homes immediately after saying the Grace After Meals following our festive meal. We can all reflect back to when we were children and remember how exciting and mysterious it was for this invisible prophet to slip in and out of our home. Somehow the level of the wine always was lower, even when we meticulously fixed our eyes on Elijah's cup. Of course we always made sure to impress our children with beautiful Passover traditions and customs. Now, they too are passing on these wonderful traditions to their children. We do not just pass these traditions on out of happenstance; we are commanded to do so. In Parsha Bo, 13:8, God commands Moshe, "And thou shalt tell thy son in that day, saying: It is because of that which the Lord did for me when I came forth out of Egypt."

So what is the real meaning of Elijah's presence at our Seder dinner? The Torah refers to Passover as a "guarded night", just as we were guarded from the plagues in Egypt. By opening our doors and letting Elijah in, we are affirming our trust in God to protect and guard us throughout our lives. It is also said that Elijah is present at all circumcision ceremonies to give witness to the mitzvah of circumcision. In turn, it is accepted that another reason Elijah comes to our home during the Seder meal is to give validation that all males at the table are circumcised.

A number of years ago, I read an endearing story about the meaning of Elijah that I have related at our family's Seder. The story goes as such; Well over a century ago in a small shtetl in Eastern Europe, an older wealthy Jew asked the Rebbe what Elijah was all about? He related that his entire life, he always looked at Elijah's cup and the level of wine never changed which made him question the validity of Elijah's presence. The Rebbe told the gentleman that he would demonstrate to him what he was looking for in Elijah. He told the gentleman to find an impoverished Jewish family and provide the family with a kosher Seder meal and lead that family's Seder ceremony. He was also told to provide the family with ample kosher Pesach food for the entire holiday week. The elderly man did exactly what the Rebbe told him to do. A couple of weeks passed when the gentleman again ran into the Rebbe. He expressed to the Rebbe that he did exactly as he was instructed. He lamented that he had his eye's glued on Elijah's cup and the level of wine never changed. He was so hopeful that he would finally have a physical sign that Elijah was there and thus he would better understand the meaning of Elijah's presence. The Rebbe again asked the man if he had provided a kosher Seder meal and the man said yes. He asked if he conducted the Seder ceremony for the family and the man answered affirmatively. Finally, the Rebbe asked if he gave kosher food the entire time of Passover to the impoverished Jewish family and the man answered nodding his head. The Rebbe proceeded to tell the gentleman, "Now you should really understand the meaning of Elijah. The mitzvah of what you have done gives testimony to the true meaning of Elijah".

I really hope that you will have a wonderful time with your families and friends over the Passover holiday. May you go from strength to strength in your lives and always reflect in your lives the meaning of Passover and the meaning of Elijah.

Siyyum Bechorim

Fast of the First Born

Wednesday, April 8 at 7:00 AM Join us for minyan and study

Join us at Congregation B'nai Israel for a Siyyum Bechorim. Those who participate are exempted from fasting.

All are welcome; it is not limited to the first-born.

Because the first-born of the Israelites were saved from the tenth plague, tradition requires that all first-born Jewish males fast from Erev Pesach until the Seder. The fast is called Taanit Bechorim. However, the law states that when any Jew hears the completion of a tractate of Rabbinic Literature, it is cause to celebrate and cancels the fast.

Service of Reaffirmation

Thursday, April 9 at 9:30 AM

Since Pesach is exactly 6 months from the High Holidays, we are afforded the opportunity to reaffirm our connection to God, to Judaism and to Torah, not just once, but at least twice a year. Pesach, when we became a free nation, is the most appropriate time other than the High Holy Days to reaffirm this connection.

Our special service of Reaffirmation will be on the first day of Pesach Thursday, April 9th at 9:30 AM.

Eruv Tavshilin

There is a tradition to make an Eruv Tavshilin for the Holidays when they fall before Shabbat. Since we do not cook on Yom Tov for the next day of Shabbat and we cannot cook meals on Shabbat, we make an Eruv Tavshilin by setting aside two cooked items on Erev Yom Tov, such as a hard boiled egg, challah, meat or fish, and make the following declaration:

בְּרוּך אַתָּה יְ-יָ אֶ-לֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶך הָעוֹלָם אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשָׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתָיו וצוּנוּ על מצות עירוּב

Baruch ata Ado-noi Elo-heinu melech ha-olam, Asher kid-shanu bi-mitzvo-tav Vi-tzee-vanu, al mitzvat eiruv.

"We bless You our God, Creator of the Universe, Who has sanctified us with Your commandments, and taught us concerning the observance of the eruv."

By means of this eruv, may we be permitted to bake, cook, keep dishes warm, light candles, and prepare during the Holiday for Shabbat.

"Shir HaShirim" -Song of Songs

Shabbat Chol HaMoed Morning Saturday, April 11 at 9:30 AM

Join us at Congregation B'nai Israel to hear Hazzan Lichterman and our Congregants chant excerpts from "Shir HaShirim" in English and Hebrew.

"Shir HaShirim" otherwise known as the "Song of Songs" or "Song of Solomon", is a romantic love poem from the Tanakh that is also interpreted as a love song between God and the People of Israel.

Memorialize Your Loved Ones Come to the Yizkor Service

Thursday, April 16 - 8th Day of Pesach Services begin at 9:30 AM, Yizkor at 11:00 AM

Yizkor is a brief service held four times a year, during which individuals ask for Gd's blessing and formally recall the memories of their loved ones who are no longer alive. It is appropriate to quietly recite the names - Hebrew names particularly, or in English, of the loved ones we recall. It is recited for immediate family, but also for grandparents, cousins, and dear friends. It is also customary to light a yahrzeit candle the previous evening in memory of your deceased relatives.

Mehirat Hametz: The Selling of Hametz

The ceremony of removing leaven (bedikat Hametz) is to take place Tuesday evening, April 7, 2020. Hametz may be eaten until 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, April 8, 2020. The Passover home atmosphere is created each year by the traditional practice of thoroughly cleansing the home, and by the removal of hametz, or leaven, in preparation for Pesach, as well as throughout the Passover days, both at home and away.

The term hametz is applied not only to foods, but also to the dishes and utensils in which the foods are prepared or served during the year. "Any manner of hametz (leavened food or utensils) owned by a Jew during the Passover holiday is forbidden to use."

Since conditions make it impossible to literally fulfill the Biblical command to destroy all leavened products, our sages instituted a practice called Mehirat Hametz, the selling of hametz. We are reminded of the necessity to divest ourselves of ownership of hametz, and make our home ritually ready. of the synagogue and a non-Jew. After Passover the hametz is repurchased by the Jewish community.

If you would like Cantor Lichterman to sell your hametz, please fill out the form below and return it to the synagogue office no later than Wednesday April 8th, following morning minyan.

Don't Sell All your Hametz!

When cleaning out your cupboard and pantries in preparation for Pesach, consider donating unopened packages of hametz and canned goods to a food pantry such as JFS. Items such as crackers, rice, cookies, lentils, tuna, and peanut butter will be gratefully accepted by these organizations and passed on to those whose cupboards are empty.

Let those who are hungry this Passover season share in your celebration by receiving food that you might otherwise "sell" or dispose of. Food can be brought to the synagogue where receptacles will be clearly marked.

CBI PESACH KASHRUT ALERT 2020/5780

In Nov. 2015 the Committee on Jewish Law of Conservative Judaism announced a decision permitting kitniyot (ie. rice, corn, legumes) on Pesach.

Here are some guidelines:

1. Fresh corn on the cob, fresh beans may be used on Pesach and purchased during the holiday.

2. Dried kitniyot can be purchased before the holiday bagged or in boxes and checked for hametz. These should not be purchased from bins as the bins may contain hametz.

3. Canned kitniyot must have Pesach certification since canning may involve hametz.

4. Frozen raw kitniyot like corn, edamame, soy beans etc. may be purchased in bags before the holiday and do not require Pesach certification, but should be checked for hametz.

5. Processed kitniyot including tofu require Pesach certification as they may contain hametz.

6. Those who continue the restriction on kitniyot, may eat from dishes and utensils that have come into contact with kitniyot on the holiday, and may eat kitniyot derivatives like oil, etc.





WOMEN OF CBI BOOK CLUB APRIL SELECTION: "Spies of No Country: Secret Lives at the Birth of Israel"

Journalist and award-winning author Matti Friedman's tale of Israel's first spies reads like an espionage novel--but it's all true. The four agents at the center of this story were part of a ragtag unit known as the Arab Section, conceived during World War II by British spies and Jewish militia leaders in Palestine. Intended to gather intelligence and carry out sabotage operations, the unit consisted of Jews who were native to the Arab world and could thus easily assume Arab identities.

In 1948, with Israel's existence hanging in the balance, these men went undercover in Beirut, where they spent the next two years operating out of a newsstand, collecting intelligence and sending messages back to Israel via a radio whose antenna was disguised as a clothesline. Of the dozen spies in the Arab Section at the war's outbreak, five were caught and executed. But in the end, the Arab Section would emerge as the nucleus of the Mossad, Israel's vaunted intelligence agency.

Spies of No Country is about the slippery identities of these young spies, but it's also about the complicated identity of Israel, a country that presents itself as Western but in fact has more citizens with Middle Eastern roots and traditions, like the spies of this narrative. Meticulously researched and masterfully told, Spies of No Country is an eye-opening look at the paradoxes of the Middle East.


