Chessed Meals

The word TOT chessed in Hebrew is usually translated as 'kindness.' It first occurs in the Torah in Genesis 24: 12. The context is Eliezer, Abraham's assistant who prays to God to show him kindness by enabling him to succeed in the mission with which Abraham has charged him, to find a suitable wife for Isaac.

The importance of this Jewish concept of chessed is demonstrated by its inclusion as one of the thirteen attributes of God, as listed in the Torah Exodus 34: 6-7. From this context of chessed we learn that Judaism considers it a form of mercy, and a form of tsedaka – righteousness.

What is a synagogue, a Jewish congregation, if its membership and leadership do not practice this divinely inspired attribute abundantly? I am thrilled to inform our congregation, if you don't already know, that recently a wonderful new tsedaka project was inaugurated at CBI.

This project, called Chessed Meals is an outgrowth of our already active Chessed Committee that was revitalized a few years ago. At first I began receiving distress calls from congregants or about congregants in need. My dear wife, Jan, jumped to the immediate rescue cooking and delivering as needed. (If I could cook I would have too!) Then I alerted a few individuals I knew I could rely on who also jumped to the rescue.

Eventually these individuals realized there was a need for a greater, concerted and more formal effort. In response to this growing number of congregants who, due to Covid, illness, surgery, accidents, shiva, isolation, old age etc. needed our help, an anonymous group of kind-hearted and devoted congregants came together. Thus far, they have prepared some 100 meals.

These are delicious, wholesome, meat, dairy or vegetarian. Many have already been distributed free of charge through home delivery on an almost daily basis by these volunteers. The other meals are in our freezer awaiting your call and needs. Just pick up the phone and let us know, with the assurance of the utmost confidentiality. This is not a time to be bashful or proud. Your meals will be delivered to your doorstep upon request at no charge.

CBI's Chessed Committee is the epitome of kindness and tsedaka. Yasher koach and heartfelt thanks to this devoted group of volunteers who embody the spirit of "matan b'seter – giving anonymously." This is one of Judaism's greatest mitzvot, and by performing chessed so abundantly, you are acting in the image of God.

The Reality of Hope

During these turbulent times, nobody needs any additional bad news. So, this month, I am including a positive article I recently read. It wasn't something of which I was aware. Plus, it aligns with current agreements recently signed between Israel and several Arab countries.

"Albania, a small and mountainous country on the southeast coast of the Balkan peninsula, was home to a population of 803,000. Of those only two hundred were Jews. After Hitler's rise to power in 1933, many Jews found refuge in Albania. No accurate figures exist regarding their number; however, different sources estimate that 600-1,800 Jewish refugees entered that country from Germany, Austria, Serbia, Greece and Yugoslavia, in the hope to continue on to the Land of Israel or other places of refuge.

Following the German occupation in 1943, the Albanian population, in an extraordinary act, refused to comply with the occupier's orders to turn over lists of Jews residing within the country's borders. Moreover, the various governmental agencies provided many Jewish families with fake documentation that allowed them to intermingle amongst the rest of the population. The Albanians not only protected their Jewish citizens, but also provided sanctuary to Jewish refugees who had arrived in Albania, when it was still under Italian rule, and now found themselves faced with the danger of deportation to concentration camps.

The remarkable assistance afforded to the Jews was grounded in Besa, a code of honor, which still today serves as the highest ethical code in the country. Besa, means literally "to keep the promise." One who acts according to Besa is someone who keeps his word, someone to whom one can trust one's life and the lives of one's family.

The help afforded to Jews and non-Jews alike should be understood as a matter of national honor. The Albanians went out of their way to provide assistance; moreover, they competed with each other for the privilege of saving Jews. These acts originated from compassion, loving-kindness and a desire to help those in need, even those of another faith or origin.

Albania, the only European country with a Muslim majority, succeeded in the place where other European nations failed. Almost all Jews living within Albanian borders during the German occupation, those of Albanian origin and refugees alike, were saved, except members of a single family. Incredibly, there were more Jews in Albania at the end of the war than beforehand."

To some of you this may be a familiar tale. Thankfully, there were other stories of strength and decency during the Holocaust about saving innocent lives.

With the establishment of the modern Jewish state of Israel in 1948, there have been ongoing attempts to destroy it since day one. In recent months, several agreements have been reached with Israel and its Arab neighbors that acknowledge its inalienable right to exist as well as establish a working relationship on many levels including technology, energy, medical science etc. It started with the United Arab Emirates and now includes Bahrain, Sudan and Morocco. It appears Saudi Arabia is possibly moving closer to an agreement as well in the future. What seemed impossible not so long ago, is now reality. That's the eternal beauty of hope.





13 Purim Facts Every Jew Should Know

1. Purim Is the Jolliest Day of the Year

The jolly festival of Purim is celebrated every year on the 14th of the Hebrew month of Adar (late winter/early spring). Purim 2021 begins on Thursday night, February 25 and continues through Friday, February 26, (February 27 in Jerusalem). It commemorates the salvation of the Jewish people in ancient Persia from Haman's plot "to destroy, kill, and annihilate all the Jews, young and old, infants and women, in a single day."

2. Purim Is a Persian Word

Purim means "lots" in ancient Persian. The holiday was thus named since the evil Haman had thrown lots to determine when he would carry out his diabolical scheme. In Eastern tradition, it is called poo-REEM Among Westerners, it is often called PUH-rim. Some Central-European communities even call it PEE-rim.

3. Mordechai and Esther Are the Heroes of the Day

Mordechai was the leader of the Jewish people in Persia, and Esther was his cousin. Forcibly made queen of Persia, Esther bravely interceded—putting her own life on the line—on behalf of her people. The story of their heroism is recorded in the Book of Esther.

4. The Book of Esther Is Handwritten on Parchment

Per Esther's request, the events were written in a scroll to be read every year on Purim. This scroll, called the Megillah (Book of Esther), was one of the final books to be canonized in the Tanach. A genuine Megillah must be written by a scribe on parchment—a painstaking process that takes several days or weeks to complete.

5. There Are Four Purim Mitzvahs

Purim is celebrated by observing the following four rituals:

- Reading the Megillah which recounts the story of the Purim miracle. This is done once on the eve of Purim and again the following day.
- · Giving monetary gifts to at least two poor people.
- · Sending gifts of two kinds of food to at least one person.
- A festive Purim feast, which often includes wine or other intoxicating beverages.

6. We Spin "Graggers" on Purim

Graggers are spinning noisemakers (ratchets) used to drown out Haman's name during the Megillah reading. Since every word must be heard clearly, the reader repeats the name after the racket has died down. Although traditionally made of wood, graggers can be made of tin, plastic, or anything else. In a pinch, pounding on the table, stamping one's feet, or shaking one's keys will suffice.

7. People Drink Wine on Purim

The sages of the Talmud assert that "a person is obligated to drink on Purim until he does not know the difference between 'blessed is Mordechai and cursed is Haman.'" Obviously, this does not apply to anyone who may become ill or act inappropriately when intoxicated.

8. Purim is Preceded by a Fast

On the day before Purim (or on the Thursday before, when Purim is on Sunday), it is customary to fast, commemorating Esther's fasting and praying to G d that He save His people.

9. Hamantaschen and Kreplach: Purim Treats

G-d's involvement in the Purim miracle was hidden; it appeared as if our people's salvation came by way of natural means. Indeed, the day is celebrated with delicacies where the delicious filling is hidden inside dough. Classic hamantaschen are a sweet three-cornered pastry filled with poppy seeds, and meat-filled kreplach are traditionally cooked and served in chicken soup at the festive meal. The seeds recall Esther's vegetarian diet in the royal palace, where she secretly kept kosher.

10. We Masquerade on Purim

People traditionally dress up on Purim, wear masks, or otherwise make themselves look somewhat unusual. Like the "hidden" treats mentioned above, many say that concealing ourselves behind a costume reflects the way G-d operated behind a cloak of natural events.

11. People Say "Purim Torah"

In keeping with the over-the-top atmosphere of the day, people (especially learned Jews) share "Purim Torah," in which silliness and scholarship mesh into a dizzying blend of witty (and sometimes absurd) exegeses.

12. Purim Is Deferred One Day in Jerusalem

Purim is observed on Adar 14, the day that the Jews rested after trouncing their enemies in battle. In the capital city of Shushan, there were so many bad guys that it took an additional day of fighting to ensure their safety, so they rested on the following day, Adar 15. Since Shushan was walled, it was declared that all walled metropolises (chiefly, but not only, Jerusalem) would celebrate on that later date. This second Purim is known as "Shushan Purim."

13. Purim Is Always a Month and a Day Before Passover

Purim is celebrated on 14 Adar, and Passover starts on 15 Nissan. In a Jewish leap year there are two Adars, making for a total of 13 months. In those years, Purim is celebrated during the second Adar, so that it is close to Passover. This is so that the miraculous salvation of Purim is as close as possible to the miracle of the Exodus, commemorated on Passover.

If you need an escape from our current reality or if you need a break for Shabbat, here are some wonderful books by Jewish authors that you can borrow from the CBI library.






