

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Pesach Through the Lens of HOPE

Like many of you, I am watching way more news these days than I used to. The other day I caught a glimpse of a CNN news brief of Israelis dancing in celebration of having received the Covid19 vaccine. Contrast that with the frantic midnight internet search ritual for Covid vaccination appointments in Toledo that I (and many of you I assume) recently endured, till finally successful!

A year ago for my Pesach bulletin article, I wrote about reinterpreting the three matzot of the seder plate in light of the drastically altered Pesach sedarim and celebrations thrust upon us. It is now a year later and who would have thought this modern-day plague would stubbornly persist and linger so long?

Yet, I would like to assure you that hope is around the corner. "Hope" is that very Jewish trait that has sustained us throughout history. It is ever-present in the seder plate symbolism. I offer these reinterpretations through this lens of "hope," in the realization that there are multiple facets to each of these brilliantly conceived symbols. These deliberately stimulate our senses of seeing, hearing, smelling, tasting and touching, despite the fact that for many Covid victims our senses of smell and taste have been (and continue to be) dulled!

Zeroa, the roasted shankbone is reminiscent of sacrifices of thanksgiving our ancestors offered. Our HOPE is that we always have something to be thankful for. Often, this requires sacrifice. Because of Covid, each of us can find new and worthwhile priorities that may have emerged, that have improved our lives significantly as a result.

ביצה Beitsah, a roasted egg is also reminiscent of sacrifices, the paschal sacrifice brought each holiday to the Temple. The egg is also associated with mourning during shiva. It is a seed, round or oval representing the cycle of life and the HOPE of rebirth. Rebirth doesn't happen coincidentally. It requires effort. It must be worked at. Some of it's prerequisites are patience and a positive attitude that the spinning wheel of life will eventually rotate and bring us up to the top.

Maror, the bitter herbs remind us that even today, or especially today, we are in a sense still very much slaves. This begs the question worth discussing around the seder table: what can WE do to help end our modern day slaveries, whether Covid or whatever you think they are. Each of our efforts can contribute towards fostering positive change, and thereby transforming maror into HOPE, as our next symbol below does.

חרוסת Charoset, the sweet-tasting mix represents the mortar of the bricks used by the slaves. It is simultaneously sour in symbolism but sweet in taste. Yet its sweet taste that children especially seem to relish, represents the HOPE of redemption that followed slavery, and the building of a new society with all its optimistic anticipation, represented by our final symbol below.

Karpas, the green vegetable, often parsley, represents the HOPE of rebirth, the yearning for spring, which indeed is one of the names of Passover – Chag Ha'aviv – Holiday of Spring. Mother Earth begins to sprout again and nature's cycle brings forth growth, as we (hopefully) emerge from a long, cold winter, and dust off the webs.

The isolation that Covid has wrought will end and we shall begin to rebuild our lives, not only as before, but perhaps better than ever. Never again will or should we take the gift of life for granted. Rather should we find something every day to make a bracha over, and to say in the words of Pesach,

"זכר ליציאת מצרים, we remember the time we were all slaves. But now we raise the cup of wine as our joy of life runneth over, and all declare loudly l'chayim – to life! May you all enjoy a safe, beautiful Pesach!

Zionism, Herzl and the Return of the Maccabees

February 14, 2021 was the 125th anniversary of the 1896 publication of "Der Judenstaat" by Theodore Herzl. Arguably translated as either "The Jewish State" or "The State of the Jews". Regardless, it set the foundation for modern Zionism and the reestablishment of the state of Israel in 1948.

Der Judenstaat was Herzl's response to the failure of emancipation of the Jewish people in Europe. The prejudices and persecution of the Jews had persisted for millennia without end. There were periods of time when that persecution took the form of forced expulsion and genocidal murder. Herzl believed in Judaism as a national identity and not just a religion. He changed the discourse regarding anti-Semitism from seeking individual civil rights to attaining national recognition. His famous line at the end of Der Judenstaat being "We are a people – one people!"

Herzl had a vision of a Jewish state established as an aristocratic republic. He warned against theocracy and too much military involvement in the affairs of state. He was weary of democracy initially. Some would describe him as a snob with high regard for western European Jews but disdain for the Jews of eastern European shtetls. He wanted to create a Vienna of the Mediterranean. The western European Jewish aristocrats, he believed, would be the benefactors to establish this center of culture. If Europe would continue to expel the Jews, the Jewish people will just build something as good or better. Is that snobbery? I say no. In my opinion, although Herzl would learn he was wrong about the Jews of the shtetls, his view of a Vienna of the Mediterranean was more indicative of the capabilities of the Jewish people. The state of Israel has proven that to this day as a technological powerhouse among its multitude of success stories.

Surprisingly to Herzl, western European Jews did not welcome Zionism as he thought they would. The wealth of western European aristocracy was not an open door to establish a Jewish state. It turned out to be the Jews of eastern Europe who championed Zionism. Herzl knew he had been wrong and later embraced his eastern European supporters. He was a man of conviction but also open-minded enough to understand he could not foresee everything. He could at times change his thinking to parallel the reality of the situation.

The World Zionist Congress (WZC) was established to further the cause of Zionism. Although Herzl's vision was of an aristocratic republic, the body became more aligned with the ideals of democracy. The WZC became a very democratic body with representation from anyone interested in joining. The Israeli Knesset would be a direct political continuation of the WZC as all segments of Israeli society are represented, including Arabs.

Most Jewish people worldwide are centered in Israel and the United States. As the years pass and new generations emerge, there appears to be a growing disconnect between Israel and American Jews. The further removed from the Holocaust and the establishment of the modern Jewish state in 1948, as well as the geographical distance, the more that disconcerting division seems to grow. U.S. politics have become a lightning rod for division of American Jews on their unconditional support of Israel. When political platforms change, and the newly bred political philosophy is less supportive of the Jewish state, American Jews are put in a difficult position. In consideration of this conundrum, I would harken back to the words of Theodore Herzl. "We are a people – one people!" The modern Maccabees who have retaken Judea/Israel for us all deserve our unyielding support.

Fast of the First Born

Friday, March 26 at 9:00 AM on Zoom Join us for minyan and study

Join Congregation B'nai Israel on Zoom for a Siyyum Bechorim.

Those who participate are exempted from fasting.

All are welcome; it is not limited to the first-born.

Because the first-born of the Israelites were saved from the tenth plague, tradition requires that all first-born Jewish males fast from Erev Pesach until the Seder. The fast is called Taanit Bechorim. However, the law states that when any Jew hears the completion of a tractate of Rabbinic Literature, it is cause to celebrate and cancels the fast.

Service of Reaffirmation

Sunday, March 28 at 10:00 AM on Zoom

Since Pesach is exactly 6 months from the High Holidays, we are afforded the opportunity to reaffirm our connection to God, to Judaism and to Torah, not just once, but at least twice a year. Pesach, when we became a free nation, is the most appropriate time other than the High Holy Days to reaffirm this connection.

Our special service of Reaffirmation will be on the first day of Pesach Sunday, March 28 at 10:00 AM on Zoom.

Eruv Tavshilin

There is a tradition to make an Eruv Tavshilin for the Holidays when they fall before Shabbat. Since we do not cook on Yom Tov for the next day of Shabbat and we cannot cook meals on Shabbat, we make an Eruv Tavshilin by setting aside two cooked items on Erev Yom Tov, such as a hard boiled egg, challah, meat or fish, and make the following declaration:

Baruch ata Ado-noi Elo-heinu melech ha-olam, Asher kid-shanu bi-mitzvo-tav Vi-tzee-vanu, al mitzvat eiruv.

"We bless You our God, Creator of the Universe, Who has sanctified us with Your commandments, and taught us concerning the observance of the eruv."

By means of this eruy, may we be permitted to bake, cook, keep dishes warm, light candles, and prepare during the Holiday for Shabbat.

"Shir HaShirim" -Song of Songs

Shabbat Chol HaMoed Morning Saturday, April 3 at 10:00 AM on Zoom

"Shir HaShirim" otherwise known as the "Song of Songs" or "Song of Solomon", is a romantic love poem from the Tanakh that is also interpreted as a love song between God and the People of Israel.

Memorialize Your Loved Ones Come to the Yizkor Service

Sunday, April 4: 8th Day of Pesach on Zoom Services begin at 10:00 AM, Yizkor at 10:45 AM

Yizkor is a brief service held four times a year, during which individuals ask for Gd's blessing and formally recall the memories of their loved ones who are no longer alive. It is appropriate to quietly recite the names - Hebrew names particularly, or in English, of the loved ones we recall. It is recited for immediate family, but also for grandparents, cousins, and dear friends. It is also customary to light a yahrzeit candle the previous evening in memory of your deceased relatives.

Mehirat Hametz: The Selling of Hametz

The ceremony of removing leaven (bedikat Hametz) is to take place Thursday evening, March 25, 2021. Hametz may be eaten until 10:00 AM on Friday, March 26, 2021. The Passover home atmosphere is created each year by the traditional practice of thoroughly cleansing the home, and by the removal of hametz, or leaven, in preparation for Pesach, as well as throughout the Passover days, both at home and away.

The term hametz is applied not only to foods, but also to the dishes and utensils in which the foods are prepared or served during the year. "Any manner of hametz (leavened food or utensils) owned by a Jew during the Passover holiday is forbidden to use."

Since conditions make it impossible to literally fulfill the Biblical command to destroy all leavened products, our sages instituted a practice called Mehirat Hametz, the selling of hametz. We are reminded of the necessity to divest ourselves of ownership of hametz, and make our home ritually ready.

The sale of hametz is conducted between a representative of the synagogue and a non-Jew. After Passover the hametz is repurchased by the Jewish community.

If you would like Cantor Lichterman to sell your hametz, please fill out the form below and return it to the synagogue office no later than Friday, March 26th, following morning minyan, or no later than 10:30 AM that day.

Don't Sell All your Hametz!

When cleaning out your cupboard and pantries in preparation for Pesach, consider donating unopened packages of hametz and canned goods to a food pantry such as JFS. Items such as crackers, rice, cookies, lentils, tuna, and peanut butter will be gratefully accepted by these organizations and passed on to those whose cupboards are empty.

CBI PESACH KASHRUT ALERT 2021/5781

In Nov. 2015 the Committee on Jewish Law of Conservative Judaism announced a decision permitting kitniyot (ie. rice, corn, legumes) on Pesach.

Here are some guidelines:

- 1. Fresh corn on the cob, fresh beans may be used on Pesach and purchased during the holiday.
- 2. Dried kitniyot can be purchased before the holiday bagged or in boxes and checked for hametz. These should not be purchased from bins as the bins may contain hametz.
- 3. Canned kitniyot must have Pesach certification since canning may involve hametz.
- 4. Frozen raw kitniyot like corn, edamame, soy beans etc. may be purchased in bags before the holiday and do not require Pesach certification, but should be checked for hametz.
- 5. Processed kitniyot including tofu require Pesach certification as they may contain hametz.
- 6. Those who continue the restriction on kitniyot, may eat from dishes and utensils that have come into contact with kitniyot on the holiday, and may eat kitniyot derivatives like oil, etc.


Shoshana is currently in her third year of studies at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, the Reform movement's

seminary and is a Student Rabbi at North Reform Synagogue in Cutchogue, New York.

The Ugandan Jewish community, which is called the Abayudaya, traces its roots to the early 20th century, when a former leader read the Bible and embraced Judaism. Most of the community's 2,000 members were converted under the auspices of U.S. Conservative rabbis in the early 2000s and thus are not recognized as Jewish by Israel's Orthodox Chief Rabbinate. Nambi says her grandparents started practicing Judaism, and her immediate family has been doing so ever since.

She hopes to return to her community one day and serve as a role model for other women and girls, but anticipates that she won't be able to do so in the near future.



If you need an escape from our current reality or if you need a break for Shabbat, here are some more wonderful books by Jewish authors that you can borrow from the CBI library.










