"Our Feet Stood Within Your Gates..."

Unbelievably, it has been six years since the last CBI Confirmation class trip to Israel. It was twice postponed due to Covid. But in the greater scheme of things, worse things have happened during or as a result of the Covid pandemic, so you won't find me complaining.

By the time you read this article, at long last, 10 of us – Adam and Andy Davis, Daniel and Aidan Mahoney, Maya Markham, Aaron, Caleb and Haley Smith, accompanied by Hope Davis and myself, will be on an airplane somewhere over the ocean, approaching the land of our dreams, foundation of our Jewish covenantal creed, Eretz Israel.

Our students worked hard to attend and complete religious school and then became confirmed. One of the chief incentives of accomplishing this goal was to earn this almost entirely-subsidized trip to Israel, thanks to the foresight and gracious generosity of the Kripke and Steinberg families. This will be CBI's fifth Confirmation trip, with participation of about 100 of our students over the years thanks to the Sherwin and Naomi Kripke Israel Fund and the Abe and Dorothy Steinberg SKIP (Send Kids to Israel Program) Fund. Additional funds are contributed from the Toledo Jewish Foundation Israel Experience Fund and our students diligently offset costs through our 'Hire a Mensch Program.'

We in Toledo should be so proud that a congregation like ours of modest size and means can claim this rare, historic distinction that is the envy of much larger and wealthier synagogues anywhere in the world. We are indeed privileged and honored!

As we arrive in Jerusalem on our first day, we shall look down from the hills and observe a majestic view pictured by our Kings, prophets and poets. Then, in a true 'Kodak moment' we shall recite the Shehecheyanu blessing and Psalm 122, a quote from which is the title to this article:

"*" ריש*מחתי באומרים לי בית ה' נלך" - *"I rejoiced when they said unto me, 'Let us go up to the House of God.' Our feet stood firmly within your gates, O Jerusalem, built up as a city united together."* Our students will have this experience in person as they walk with their own feet in places they learned about in religious school and B'nai Mitzvah preparation. It will all come alive before their very own eyes, in a truly great and climactic culmination of their high school (two students are already in college!) Jewish educational journey.

I have had the joy to work intensively with each of these eight wonderful students, guiding them through b'nai mitzvah and onward to Confirmation. I have watched and, hopefully, contributed positively towards fostering their Jewish maturation and confidence. It is my fervent hope that their studies at CBI and especially this trip, will lead to lifelong impactful Jewish learning, growth and pride.

This is my third CBI Confirmation trip. If past trips are any indication, they are in for an extraordinary experience, with the potential to change their lives forever as young, evolving Jews. A hearty yasher koach/thanks go to Kim Brody, Michelle Blacher Kaplan of Travels and Dialogues, Gabi, Rhoda and CBI, Federation, and the Kripke and Steinberg families for making this all possible!

Diversity, Inclusion and the Jewish People

Over the last several years, words like diversity and inclusion have been hot button topics in the political and social arena. Many different ideas have grown out of that movement. Some good and some not so good. The not so good has sometimes been expressed as anti-Zionist and a vocal lack of inclusion of the Jewish people. In addition, there are some organizations that have expressed anti-Semitic ideas as part of their platform. This has made me, as a Jew, very cautious before supporting any groups who use diversity and inclusion as their rallying cry.

Taking a step back, think about how we as Jewish people have long looked at our fellow human beings. In my life, I have only witnessed an inclusive philosophy towards all people. No groups of peoples were turned away from conversion nor involvement in our programs. I don't believe a lack of inclusion and diversity to be a Jewish issue. We were inclusive before it was cool as they say. I think it's always been a point of pride in Judaism. Hatred, prejudice and ignorance have never been taught or included in any part of a Jewish education. In fact, quite the opposite.

Think of modern examples in Israel when Palestinians come to Israeli hospitals to be cared for even after being injured while violently attacking innocent Israeli citizens. In addition, Israel is the only country to drop leaflets and make calls to target sites to try to prevent civilian injuries and deaths before destroying weapons caches and rocket launchers. Point being that hatred is not even extended to those who would do them harm.

With widespread demonization of Israel (ergo the Jewish people), we find ourselves in the usual position of isolation. As noted in the New York Times, people like Linda Sarsour, Tamika Mallory and Carmen Perez-Jordan who led the Women's March on Washington to change the face of American feminism by highlighting the voices of women of color, as well as sexual minorities, were anti-Semitic. These co-chairs were accused of anti-Semitism based on comments they made, associations with known anti-Semites like Louis Farrakhan, as well as ousting one of the earliest organizers of the movement, Vanessa Wruble. Ms. Wruble, who is Jewish, blamed blatant anti-Semitism for her treatment. The Black Lives Matter movement has also been accused of anti-Semitic comments.

So, what does this all mean? Support Progressive causes, don't support Progressive causes or what? My personal opinion is that we need to be careful before jumping onboard with groups who may espouse benevolent ideas like inclusion before we know where they stand on Judaism, Zionism and Israel. That doesn't mean we cannot support a worthy cause or movement, it just means the group leading that cause must be carefully vetted, as we may not want to align with that particular group. Judaism has long been associated with inclusion and diversity because prejudice has never been a tenet of our religion. Issues that directly affect us as Jews, and the Jewish state of Israel, always has to be our top priority because nobody else will make it so. We cannot be in alliances, no matter the cause, with any groups who hold beliefs that are counter to our own existence. Ideas that bring us together as Jews, regardless of race, nationality, gender, sexual orientation etc, should always unite us.

"The Curious Incident on Mt. Sinai: Moses and the Breaking of the Tablets"



WOMEN OF CBI BOOK CLUB IUNE SELECTION "Jerusalem: A Cookbook" by Yotam Ottolenghi and Sami Tamimi Tuesday, June 28, 2022 11:00 AM at the home of Cathy Sperling

A collection of 120 recipes exploring the flavors of Jerusalem from the New York Times bestselling author of Plenty, one of the most lauded cookbooks of 2011. In Jerusalem, Yotam Ottolenghi re-teams with his friend (and the co-owner of his restaurants) Sami Tamimi. Together they explore the vibrant cuisine of their home city--with its diverse Muslim, Jewish, Arab, Christian, and Armenian communities. Both men were born in Jerusalem in the same year--Tamimi on the Arab east side and Ottolenghi in the Jewish west. This cookbook offers recipes from their unique cross-cultural perspectives including Charred Baby Okra with Tomato and Preserved Lemon, Braised Lamb Meatballs with Sour Cherries, and Clementine and Almond Cake. With five bustling restaurants in London and two stellar cookbooks, Ottolenghi is one of the most respected chefs in the world; Jerusalem is his most personal, original, and beautiful cookbook vet.


CBI Library Books to Read or Re-read

is a 2008 PBS Home Video written and directed by David Grubin. This 6-hour series traces 350 years of Jewish American history from the arrival of the first Jews in 1654 to present day. Focusing on the tension between identity & assimilation, "it tells the story of the struggle of a tiny minority to make their way into the American mainstream."

(Animated) In 1885 Shostka, Russia, the Mousekewitzes, a Russian-Jewish family of mice decide to immigrate after an army of cruel cats destroy their village. During the trip overseas, the family's young 7-year-old son, Fievel, gets separated from the others and washes overboard in a storm. They arrive sadly on Ellis Island, New York, believing they've lost their son. Fievel, however, floats to nearby Liberty Island and after many adventures he is reunited with his family.

The Grey Zone

Based on real-life events, this compelling and harrowing film chronicles a unit of Auschwitz's Sunderkommando, a special squad of Jewish prisoners who staged the only armed revolt that would ever take place at Auschwitz. Starring David Arquette, Steve Buscemi, Harvey Keitel and Mira Sorvino, this 2001 film is rated R due to the subject matter.
