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Tu biShvat Keeps on Growing

Tu biShvat, the Jewish New Year for Fruit Trees, is coming up soon, beginning on the evening of Sunday, February 1, and continuing into the day of the 2nd. (CBI will be holding an early Tu biShvat seder on Sunday, February 1 at 10:30 AM in connection with the holiday - please be sure to RSVP). It often strikes us as odd that we celebrate the new year of the trees in the middle of winter when trees seem to be the most dormant, but Tu biShvat has a long and varied history in Judaism, evolving over many centuries, and when you consider its original purpose it makes some sort of sense.

First of all, the name of the holiday is just a date: the equivalent of calling a holiday "July 4th". "Tu" is the pronunciation of the Hebrew letters which stand for 15: " and Sh'vat is the name of the month in which it falls. In Mishnah Rosh Hashanah, we are told that there are four Jewish New Years, but the New Year for the Trees was a source of debate between the two major schools of Hillel and Shammai. They both agreed that it is during the month of Sh'vat, but the School of Shammai believed it was on the 1st day, while the School of Hillel, on the 15th. Usually we follow the School

of Hillel, and clearly, we do so here as well, otherwise we'd be calling this holiday "Ah biShvat" (aleph = 1)!

Why do we need a new year for trees at all? Well, in the ancient world, within the land of Israel, tithes had to be taken from fruits for each year, and they had to have some date to determine which fruits fell into one year and which fell into another. So Tu biShvat was more of an "April 15th" tax day than a "July 4th". It then makes some sort of sense that it should be at a time when fruit isn't growing on most trees because that helps clarify which "tax year" each fruit falls into. As the Gemara explains, This is the point where most of the year's rains for the new crop have already fallen, but most of the growing season is yet to come. Rashi further clarifies by saying it is at this point that due to the rain, sap has begun to rise in the trees, leading to fruit production.

During the Roman period and beyond, with much of the Jewish population living outside of the historical land of Israel (and thus tithing was not required for them), Tu biShvat (as well as the 1st of Elul, the New Year for tithing animals) increasingly became something of a historical footnote on the calendar with little actual observance associated with it. It retained a vestige of a ritual status in that fasting on Tu biShvat was forbidden, as well as giving eulogies - like other days that have sanctity or joy associated with them. The 19th Century discovery of the Cairo Geniza repository of old and lost Jewish documents also revealed that at least two piyyutim (liturgical poems) had been written Middle Ages for use on Tu biShvat, with sections to be interjected into each of the 19 b'rakhot of the Weekday Amidah. So Tu biShvat's existence was at least acknowledged in some communities, even if in a token way.

The real renaissance for Tu biShvat came with the advent of Lurianic Kabbalah in the 16th century, when the Kabbalists of Tzfat, led by Isaac Luria ("the Ari") innovated all sorts of new ideas into Judaism that were inspired by Kabbalistic mysticism, many of which remain with us today. They created a Tu biShvat seder similar to the Pesach seder (and for Sephardim, similar to the Rosh Hashanah seder, as well). The first publication of the Kabbalistic seder was in the early 18th century, as Pri Etz Hadar, though its practice and origin go back further. In keeping with the Kabbalistic idea of four worlds, there were four cups of wine with different combinations of white and red, as well as four categories of fruit: those with an inedible outside, those with an inedible inside, those that are entirely edible, and then the supernal fruit which has no physical substance at all. The idea of a Tu biShvat seder has endured, and many of them at least retain some element of the "four worlds" concept.

With the rise of the Zionist movement and the return to the land of Israel and its establishment as a state, the focus of Tu biShvat changed again, stressing the Jewish connection to the land of Israel. It became something of a "Jewish Arbor Day" when Jews around the world donated money to have trees planted in Israel. The seders tended to focus more on texts about the importance of trees in our tradition and the specific fruits that are grown in the land of Israel to connect Jews everywhere with Israel.

In recent decades, Tu biShvat has undergone another shift with increasing concerns about threats to the world's environment, and is now observed by many as a "Jewish Earth Day", though retaining many of its past connections as well. Recent iterations of Tu biShvat haggadot focus on the many traditional Jewish texts which teach that God gave us stewardship over nature and the we have an obligation to protect trees and all of nature and not abuse them. "Tikkun olam", like Tu biShvat, is a phrase that has also evolved over the centuries. Its earliest known use in Aleinu is in reference to the improvement of the world through acceptance of monotheism over idolatry, while the Kabbalists understood it in a mystical way to be releasing divine sparks in the world to help unify God. Today, however, we tend to take "tikkun olam" far more literally in its meaning of "repairing the world" - trying to slow down and repair the damage that humanity has done to nature through ecology, sustainability, and scientific innovation - and Israel has been at the forefront of much of this innovation, tying together different aspects of Tu biShvat.

Tu biShvat is a great example of the Jewish ability to take a concept and instead of letting it go when it seemingly becomes obsolete, redefining and recontextualizing it so that new generations are able to find new meanings in it which link us to the



Torah, Torah, Torah – Part 1

I've turned my curiosity to Torah and its composition as we are blessed to possess 13 Scrolls. However, only four are kosher (okay to read from), while 8 need repairs and 1 is a partial scroll (unusable). Have all Torahs been created the same way? What makes a Scroll kosher? What repairs do the eight Torahs need? Answering those questions will form my January and February columns with thanks in part to the Museum of the Bible in Washington, D.C., which has over 1,600 scrolls in their collection.

The Hebrew word "Torah" has a broad set of meanings. Literally, it means "teaching". Its most popular meaning refers to the Hebrew Bible's first five books: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy. Torah also often applies simply to the sacred scrolls on which the Hebrew text is written. You might think all scrolls would be more or less identical because they contain the same text, but there is a fair amount of variation within narrow limits.

The skins used for a Torah parchment must come from a kosher land animal, such as a cow, goat, or deer. These kosher animals possess split hooves and chew their cud, but they don't have to be slaughtered in a ritual manner. Hair is removed, skin is stretched, then scraped and smoothed to create an even writing surface. The skin is treated with preservatives to allow it to last and to give it a more aesthetically pleasing color as parchment. Not all parchment is the same, though, and this is one of the first differences between Torah Scrolls.

In the ancient world, parchment was treated with vegetable tannins. The skin, made of two membranes, was used whole, producing a thicker, more leather-like parchment, brownish in color. The Dead Sea Scrolls are written on this type of parchment, known today in Hebrew as *Gevil*. Gevil parchment continues to be used in Jewish communities that originated in North Africa and the Middle East.

A different parchment was created in the Middle Ages, by splitting off one of the skin's two membranes. Then it was treated with lime to allow for a much finer writing surface. The Hebrew word for this parchment is known today as Klaf. Klaf was initially controversial (change is hard), but has since been adopted by all European Jewish communities and their descendants in the US and Israel.

Script is another area where Torah Scrolls differ. Every scribe (sofer in Hebrew) has their own handwriting. There are also script styles unique to particular times and places. One can see differences when comparing a scroll written by a central European Sofer to one from a North African, Spanish or Polish scribe. Scripts also change over time, so a central European Scroll from 1220 looks different from a 1920 central European Scroll.

Torahs also differ in decorative elements called "tagin", which are flourishes added to a certain number of Torah Scroll letters. Most Torah Scrolls include them, but a small number, either very old or from specific communities, do not. Tagin can be embellished to create elaborate designs, sometimes done to indicate a special word interpretation. The letters with the tagin are veiled in the mysticism of Kabala. When combined, these special letters are supposed to form the divine names by which heaven and earth were created, furnishing the key to the creative power and the revelation of future events. Far out. I hope I've piqued your interest here. Part 2 comes next month.

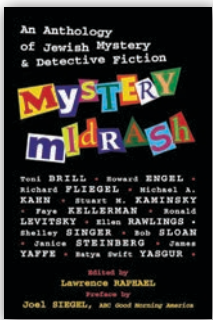

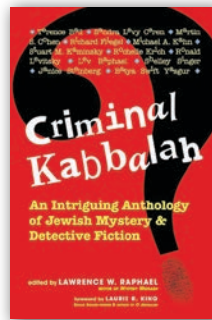


Mystery Midrash: An Anthology of Jewish Mystery & Detective Fiction

On your **Computer, Tablet or Cell Phone:**

- Go to the CBI website, cbitoledo.org.
- At the top of the home page click on "Live Stream".
- When the page opens, you will be connected to the CBI live stream service.

On your **Television:**

You can also access the live stream services through your television if you have a "smart" TV, Roku or streaming stick which gives you access to YouTube.

- Click on the YouTube icon on your TV.
- When YouTube opens, search for "Congregation B'nai Israel - Sylvania, Ohio".
- Be sure to click on the listing that has the photo with Jewish star (*see photo above*).
- We recommend that you "subscribe" to the channel so you can easily locate the live stream for future services. We also highly recommend connecting to the live stream services on your TV as it is the most immersive and closest experience, short of being in the synagogue.

Process for Funeral Arrangements and Other Life Cycle Events

If a death occurs and you need to make funeral arrangements, your first call should be to the funeral director to begin making arrangements. The funeral home will contact the CBI staff to make the necessary arrangements, including notifying the rabbi. The rabbi will then contact you to set up a meeting to gather information and plan the funeral so that he can officiate.

Please bear in mind the Rabbi does not have his phone on him during Shabbat and Yom Tov, but he will respond as soon as he is able after Shabbat or Yom Tov ends.

To schedule and plan other life cycle events, you should call the synagogue office at 419-517-8400 during office hours (M-F, 9-3). Staff members can give you the Rabbi's number or will give the Rabbi your information and he will return your call.



How to access CBI Zoom Programs & Services
